This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils’ music education.

Introduction

Music can make a powerful contribution to the education and development of children, having benefits which range from those that are largely academic to the growth of social skills and contribution to overall development. It is a unique form of communication that can change the way pupils feel, think and act. Ofsted say that children’s involvement in music engages and re-engages pupils, increasing their self-esteem, and maximising their progress in education and not just in music.

(The Importance of Music: A National Plan for Music Education; *DfE*2011)

Our music curriculum incorporates the statutory elements of the National Curriculum with the principles of Townlands vision – A journey of learning in the light of God’s love. Music is an essential part of life, which can support a child’s development and their mental wellbeing. Learning music develops all aspects of a child’s learning and encourages confidence, creativity, listening and concentration. Music is an integral part of the school community and underpins whole school collective worship. Children work collaboratively as a whole school to rehearse, sing and perform traditional hymns both in school and at church. Our music curriculum gives all children opportunities to become real musicians where they are able to compose, record, perform and evaluate their own pieces of music. Links are made with the local community and allow opportunities for vocal and instrumental performances.

Aims

- To continue to raise the profile of music at Townlands C of E Primary Academy
- To help children to express themselves individually, to share experiences and collaborate with others
- To help children develop an awareness of a variety of musical traditions, performances, instruments and cultures
- To enable children to aim for and attain high standards
- To provide an enriching music curriculum including opportunities to listen to and contribute to live performances.

Objectives

- To promote positive attitudes and enthusiasm towards music through active participation
- To provide children with the opportunity to sing and to improve their singing skills
- To help children to progress and develop their musical understanding
- To provide children with the opportunity to play a variety of instruments
- To encourage children to perform solos or as part of an ensemble
- To provide opportunities to listen to and appraise a range of music from a variety of genres and to understand the chronology of music
- To begin to understand basic musical terms and notation through performance and composition
- To investigate ways of using ICT in music education
- To embed key music knowledge through use of the music knowledge organisers and regular quizzing.

Curriculum Music

What is happening now?	Development plan target	links
As the new academic year begins (25/26) the music curriculum will follow the scheme of learning from Kapow. This scheme shows a clear progression of skills, vocabulary, composition and reading notation. This scheme also exposes all learners to a wide variety of music genres and allows them to gain a concept of the history of music. Children have regular opportunities to play and sing along to music. Cross-curricular links are made to further support learning. Music is taught weekly in class and occasionally blocks of time are booked to complete a composition project. Music is assessed using regular weekly quizzes to check taught knowledge and using the Kapow end of unit assessments.	To ensure all units have clear middle plans in place. Extra curricular

Music extra-curricular activities are currently lunch time clubs in school. The school music specialist leads choir and recorder club. These develop learning in the music curriculum through reading notation, learning to play a musical instrument (recorder) technique for singing and instrumental use, performance etiquette and understanding music vocabulary. These clubs are free of charge and SEN, Pupil Premium and Gifted and Talented children are also encouraged to join. After school drama club also links with the music curriculum and the children work towards a school production. of music genres studied through the scheme of music (Kapow) Pupil voice is used to track children's learning of music and their understanding of the music curriculum. Gaps in teacher's knowledge about music are supported and addressed by the music subject leader and CPD is delivered to staff.		
Pupil tracking Pupil attainment is assessed and tracked each term. Assessment is conducted using the Kapow assessments at the end of each unit. Small weekly quizzes are also set to support children retaining key music knowledge. The music subject lead collects this data and tracks groups of children such as SEN and Pupil Premium. This data is then used to support and group children based on their music attainment.
