Al-Fatihah	The opening chapter of the Qur'an
Ramadan	The ninth month of the Muslim year, during which strict fasting is observed from dawn to sunset
Eid-ul-Fitr	A Muslim festival marking the end of Ramadan
tawhid	To declare a oneness of God
Rak'ahs	Different body positions during prayer
